AP Language and Composition Syllabus Mr. Alwardt

Course Description:

AP English Language and Composition encourages students to become skilled readers of non-fiction prose in a variety of periods, disciplines, and rhetorical contexts and to compose for a variety of purposes. In this course, students will compose in a variety of forms—narrative, exploratory, expository, argumentative—and on a variety of subjects from personal experiences to public policies, from imaginative literature to popular culture. Students will examine the expository, analytical, and argumentative writing that forms the basis of academic and professional communications and the personal and reflective writing that fosters writing facility in any context. "It is the responsibility of informed citizens and consumers to understand how rhetoric works, so they can be wary of manipulation and deceit, while appreciating effective and civil communication" (*The Language of Composition*).

The course work is much more than the expected high school load because AP Language and Composition is a college-level course. Students will have daily and weekly homework assignments, which include varying writing assignments, vocabulary study, speeches, readings, viewing, frequent quizzes and examinations. The course will also emphasize skills related to the ACT.

Students have the option to take the Advanced Placement English and Composition Exam and may receive college credit if the exam is passed.
